Call to Order - Gail Delorey

Gail Delorey called the regular meeting of the Executive Committee of the Community Foundation for Monterey County to order at 3:30 PM, Tuesday, November 25, 2014, at the Foundation's Salinas office.

Approval of Minutes

There were no changes to the September 24, 2014 Executive Committee meeting minutes.

Motion: to approve the September 24, 2014 minutes: Greg Chilton/Alfred Diaz-Infante second. Motion carried unanimously.

Chair Report - Gail Delorey

Gail Delorey reported on Philanthropy Day and the scholarship recipients that received checks from CFMC. She reinforced that the scholarships projected much goodwill toward the CFMC.

The Executive Committee description has been updated and Dan confirmed that the allowance for a vote by email or phone is reflected in the CFMC By-Laws. Rick Kennifer questioned whether "email" requires a written vote to have "unanimous consent as described." After discussion, Dan acknowledged this would require a change in the By-Laws and that it did not directly affect the Executive Committee description as written. Dan will follow-up on the By-Law update.

Motion: to approve the 2014 Executive Committee description. Alfred Diaz-Infante / Greg Chilton second. Motion carried unanimously.

Gail reminded the committee of the annual December 16 holiday social with spouses after the board meeting.

Treasurer's Report -Tina Starkey Lopez October 31, 2014

<u>Assets</u>

Total Assets through 10/31/2014 are \$178,846,904 a 5.7% increase since October 2013 and a 2.46% increase since December 2013.

Operating Fund

Total revenue was \$123,337 more than the budget, and total expenses were \$5,281 more than the budget. The actual net operating deficit is \$109,933 compared to a budgeted deficit of \$227,989.

Note: The Expendable Operating Cash-on-Hand is at 6.0 months, excluding the operating reserve of \$250,000 and the building reserve of \$100,000.

Gifts, Pledges, Bequests, Future Funds Greater than \$25,000, and Grants

Total new contributions for the month were \$412,581, including \$50,000 from CASA Monterey County to establish the Voices for Children Stewardship Fund, \$50,000 from Mr. & Mrs. William and Nancy Doolittle for the Boys and Girls Club of the Monterey Peninsula Fund and the Farrell/Allen Carmel Rotary Fund, stock valued at \$106,890 from Mr. Fredrick W. Terman and Ms. Nan Borreson to establish the Fred Terman and Nan Borreson Fund, \$56,613 from the Estate of Mrs. Robert Stanton for the General Endowment Fund, and \$100,000 from Mr. & Mrs. Joel and Dena Gambord for the Joel and Dena Gambord Charitable Foundation Fund.

Grants to agencies for the month totaling \$306,176 were approved and recorded.

Interfund activity for the month totaled \$2,500.

Motion: to approve the October 31, 2014 financials. Greg Chilton/Alfred Diaz-Infante Motion carried unanimously.

Tina summarized the 2015 budget and discussed the changes to the calculations for the estimated annual surplus. The Finance Committee will present and recommend the budget for approval at the December board meeting.

Action item not on the agenda:

The Finance Committee is requesting the approval of a resolution to purchase three Certificates of Liability from Rabobank.

Motion: "Resolved that Daniel R. Baldwin, President/CEO is hereby authorized and empowered to establish Certificate of Deposit accounts at Rabobank, as approved by the Finance Committee of the Community Foundation for Monterey County." Alfred Diaz-Infante / Tina Starkey Lopez second. Motion carried unanimously.

Grants and Programs Committee - Alfred Diaz-Infante

Alfred Diaz-Infante reported there was one grant approval request. The CFMC Grants and Programs staff are requesting the approval of \$20,000 to the Nonprofit Alliance for Monterey County (NAMC). NAMC provides a range of programs and resources to benefit Monterey County's nonprofit sector, including research on the sector's economic and social impact in the region, educational events and legislative updates and representing the regions nonprofit sector with policy makers and public officials.

Motion: to approve a \$20,000 grant to ACTION Council to support the Nonprofit Alliance for Monterey County (NAMC). Rick Kennifer/Tina Starkey Lopez second. Motion carried unanimously.

Action item not on the agenda: Landreth Family Fund grant

Motion: to approve \$50,000 to the Monterey Bay Aquarium from the Landreth Family Fund. Greg Chilton / Alfred Diaz- Infante second. Motion carried unanimously.

Investment Committee – Dan Baldwin for Ken Petersen (absent)

Dan reported that Bill Sharpe is a new member of the Investment Committee.

The November 3 Investment Committee meeting included a discussion of the 2015 payout rate, and an analysis of whether the current 4.75% rate is sustainable going forward. The Investment Committee will recommend a 4.5% payout rate for 2015 at the December board meeting.

Governance Committee – Dan Baldwin for Ann Brown (absent)

Dan Baldwin reported on the November 25 committee meeting and confirmed Jimmy Panetta and Erica Padilla Chavez have accepted invitations to join the board. The Governance Committee will convene early in 2015 to consider adding additional board members.

At the December board meeting, the following renewals and declines will be recommended for approval:

Motion: to recommend to the full board for approval the following positions to the 2015 board of directors: Two new board members: Jimmy Panetta and Erica Padilla Chavez. Accepted second terms: Rick Kennifer, Catherine Kobrinsky Evans, Greg Chilton and Tina Starkey Lopez.

Declined second term: Jim Claypool

2015 Officers: Chair: Rick Kennifer. Vice-Chair: Greg Chilton. Secretary: Steve McGowan. Treasurer: Tina Starkey Lopez.

Greg Chilton / Alfred Diaz- Infante second. Motion carried unanimously.

Committee Descriptions

Motion: to approve the Governance, Grants and Programs, Investment and Resource Development Committee Descriptions as written.

Greg Chilton / Alfred Diaz- Infante second. Motion carried unanimously.

Resource Development Committee - Greg Chilton

Greg Chilton reviewed the current Resource Development Summary and highlighted the variety of meetings and events Christine and Dan have attended throughout the county.

The committee wants to look at the 2014 fund conversions to non-endowed funds and continue the analysis of donor advised funds as possible conversions that may make their funds the donor's primary philanthropic instrument.

MC Gives is up and running with more agency matching gifts and donor participation than in previous years.

Christine Dawson reported on the outcome of the Bubbles and Bags event. It is estimated that \$50,000 will have been raised. The proceeds after expenses go the Girls Health in Girls Hands (GHGH) program.

Funds approved electronically since last meeting - Dan Baldwin

No funds approved.

New Fund Approvals - Dan Baldwin

Dan described one new fund, the Reese Family Fund, and two funds not on the agenda: The Morse Foundation Scholarship Fund and the Howard and Ann Morgens Fund.

Motion: to approve the Reese Family Fund, the Morse Foundation Scholarship Fund and the Howard and Ann Morgens Fund. Rick Kennifer / Greg Chilton second. Motion carried unanimously.

President/CEO Report - Dan Baldwin

League of California Community Foundations (LCCF) – LCCF is working with California Volunteers (CV) in coordination with the Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES), to establish state policy, processes, and procedures for monetary donations in the aftermath of a disaster.

CA Volunteers - has created a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to formalize the relationship between CV and Community Foundations, individually, in order to establish requirements for selected community foundations to be listed on the CV website as a potential destination for monetary donations.

This process will encourage the public to donate to grantmaking organizations that grant to agencies providing direct services to the affected populations, thereby facilitating the dispersion of funds as quickly as possible.

Motion: to recommend to the full board for approval the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to formalize the relationship between California Volunteers and CFMC for a period of two years. Greg Chilton / Alfred Diaz- Infante second. Motion carried unanimously.

Dan reported on the CFMC Personnel Policy that has been updated by TPO and will be sent to attorney Sara Boynes for legal review before approval.

Dan is recommending for approval, that Friday, December 26 be brought to the board as a "one time" 2014 paid holiday for the CFMC staff. Dan and Christine will be on call in case something arises.

Motion: to approve the one time paid holiday on Friday, December 26, 2014 be added to the calendar. Rick Kennifer / Greg Chilton second. Motion carried unanimously.

Dan reported new activity on the sale of Palm Terrace and will have more information at the December board meeting.

Dan updated the committee on the hiring of Laurel Lee - Alexander as the VP of Grants and Programs. She will begin working on December 15, 2014.

Dan is attending a White House convening of about 100 Community Foundations on December 3, 2014.

Assets

Total Assets through 2/28/2015 are \$181,212,789 a 3.37% increase since February 2014, and a 1.06% increase since December 2014.

Operating Fund

Total revenue was \$3,464 more than the budget, and total expenses were \$28,525 less than the budget. The actual net operating deficit is \$428,231 compared to a budgeted deficit of \$460,219.

Note: The Expendable Operating Cash-on-Hand is at 4.6 months, excluding the operating reserve of \$250,000 and the building reserve of \$125,000.

Gifts, Pledges, Bequests, Future Funds Greater than \$25,000, and Grants

Total new contributions for the month were \$898,990 including stock valued at \$78,957 from Mr. & Mrs. William and Nancy Doolittle for the Doolittle Fund; \$650,000 for The David and Lucile Packard Foundation for The David and Lucile Packard Foundation Fund; \$95,000 from S.T.A.R. Foundation of Monterey County for the S.T.A.R. Foundation of Monterey County Stewardship Fund; and \$30,000 from Mr. & Mrs. Richard S. and Joanna Reynolds for the Richard Scott Reynolds Science and Technology Education Scholarship Fund.

Grants to agencies for the month totaling \$1,508,920 were approved and recorded.

Interfund activity for the month totaled \$13,500.

Mission Statement

- We strive for excellence in all that we do.

CFMC executive committee: I, along with the staff, have spent considerable time looking at the CFMC's strategic plan. I firmly believe the plan needs updating. The question is what process should we engage in to do this. Can we as an organization sort this out based on what we know, where we've been and the track we're on? Or do we bring in a consultant? The Community Impact grant program assessment did quite a bit of surveying of our grantees, but did not reach out to community leaders and donors.

<u>I've made suggested revisions to the existing document, to at least give you a flavor what I'm thinking. All of us here love the simplicity of our current SP, and would like to retain it, if possible, understanding that it is the board's decision.</u>

PLANNING ASSUMPTIONS

For the Community Foundation to reach the next level toward achieving its vision and mission, the board of directors used the following assumptions to guide the development of the Foundation's five-year goals:

- The Foundation needs to clarify and reinvigorate its mission. Done
- The Foundation needs to establish a truly countywide reach in all aspects of its operations. <u>Done, but still expanding.</u>
- The Foundation has reached a stage where it needs to create a more focused grant making strategy that will achieve greater impact. <u>Done, but ever</u> <u>evolving.</u>
- The Foundation will proactively seek philanthropic partners around shared priorities for focused investments. <u>Ongoing</u>
- The Foundation will elevate the place its role as a convener, partner and community leader plays in its overall presence in Monterey County. <u>Still</u> <u>developing.</u>
- The Foundation must increase its asset development to continue to grow the resources with which to address pressing community needs and support a vigorous, focused grant making program. <u>Evergreen.</u>
- The Foundation will enhance its services and support to fund holders aligned with its aspirations for higher impact philanthropy. Done, but ever evolving.
- The time has arrived for CFMC to significantly increase its communications to elevate community awareness about its brand, unique niche in Monterey County and understanding of its impact on the community. <u>Evergreen, but</u> room to grow.

The CMFC has greatly evolved its grant programs through the development of the Community Impact grant program (which was adjusted for 2015) and closely working with donor advisors. The CFMC still seeks to evolve itshave a grant making program to one that, while still-broad enough to address Monterey County's most pressing needs, has greater focus, and resulting results in tangible and demonstrable impact. All grant programs should seek to align with This program should be developed within an overarching framework that defines CFMC's programmatic purpose as "investing in healthy, safe and vibrant communities across Monterey County" — a unifying theme that also encompasses CFMC's plan to intentionally exercise its community leadership role. Goal one will be driven by the following three statements.

- 1. Proactively be a partner and catalyst for addressing community challenges.
- 2. Focus grant making toward strategic results.
- 3. Strengthen nonprofit sector excellence.

Goal Two: Philanthropic Leadership Inspire and facilitate philanthropy throughout Monterey County.

This description needs updating. The Community Foundation for Monterey County has a strong asset base, and an enviable percentage of endowed and/or discretionary assets. In its next chapter, the Foundation seeks to form new philanthropic partnerships and further increase those assets in order to continue supporting a grant making program that is fully responsive to the many needs in Monterey County. Not only should grant-making continue countywide, but so should the discovery of new philanthropic partners. The Foundation also seeks more proactive engagement with its fund holders, to support their philanthropic goals, and to involve them more fully in the Foundation's work. The Foundation will exercise greater philanthropic leadership as a complement to its increased grant making focus and intentional community leadership. Goal two will be driven by the following three statements:

<u>1. Educate the public about philanthropy.</u> 4-2. Grow CFMC's philanthropic assets.

- 2.3. Enhance fund holder philanthropy.
- 4. Seek and align with funding partners to realize greater community impacts.

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<u>Goal Three: Community Leadership</u> <u>Recognize opportunities for facilitation of solutions to</u> <u>community issues.</u>

The Community Foundation for Monterey County is a recognized leader in the nonprofit sector and the community. This position has increased as the CFMC has increased its transparency, reached out to diverse audiences across the county, enhanced the work and profile of the Center for Nonprofit Excellence, and developed stronger partnerships with agencies and regional funders. Community leadership is an area that requires tremendous diplomacy, marked by a desire to help facilitate positive outcomes rather than work toward a pre-conceived CFMC solution.

- 1. Be mindful of emerging circumstances and issues where the CFMC can be a positive player in finding community solutions.
- 2. Respond proactively to emergencies, disasters, civic unrest, and other circumstances in which the board of directors feels the CFMC can play a positive role.
- 3. Participate in the League of California Community Foundations legislative advocacy work, and sign on to initiatives when appropriate.
- 4. Utilize CFMC assets for community impact beyond grant making.

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5. Goal ThreeFour: Operational Organizational Excellence Optimize performance and stewardship for maximum impact.

This description needs updating. At this juncture in CFMC's development, there is agreement that attention needs to be devoted to the Foundation's own internal capacity, even as it is recognized for its investments in the organizational effectiveness of the nonprofit sector throughout Monterey County. This need for some internal attention is validated -- at least with respect to governance and communications – by the views of external stakeholders.

- 1. <u>Continue to linvest in infrastructure (human, financial and technological) improvements aligned with CFMC's goals.</u>
- 2. <u>Continue to e</u>Elevate CFMC visibility countywide; tell our story more effectively.
- 3. Build and mMaintain a strong, innovative, diverse board of directors and staff that reflect Monterey County.
- 3.4. Operate in an environmentally responsible way.
