#### Call to Order - Rick Kennifer

Rick Kennifer called the regular meeting of the Executive Committee of the Community Foundation for Monterey County to order at 3:35 PM, Tuesday, March 31, 2015, at the Foundation's Salinas office.

#### **Approval of Minutes**

There was one correction to the November 25, 2014 Executive Committee meeting minutes. Greg Chilton noted on page 2 of the minutes, the Action item not on the agenda should read Certificate of Deposit not Certificate of Liability.

"The Finance Committee is requesting the approval of a resolution to purchase three Certificates of Liability Deposit from Rabobank." (Corrected language 3/2015 JC)

Motion: to approve the November 25, 2014 minutes: Greg Chilton / Alfred Diaz-Infante second. Motion carried unanimously.

#### Chair Report - Rick Kennifer

Rick Kennifer noted the Women's Fund Luncheon is April 30, 2015 starting at 11:30 AM at the Hyatt Hotel in Monterey. The Women's Fund is celebrating 10 years and will highlight new initiatives and close the \$1.5 million endowment campaign.

The Council on Foundations conference is April 26-28 in San Francisco. Three board members and five staff members will attend. Dan Baldwin will facilitate a session on Endowment Building.

Rick reported the board will be asked at the April 21 board meeting to pass a resolution for 100% board contributions for 2015. It is a requirement for a pending grant application.

### Treasurer's Report -Tina Starkey Lopez February 28, 2015

#### **Assets**

Total Assets through 2/28/2015 are \$181,212,789 a 3.37% increase since February 2014, and a 1.06% increase since December 2014.

#### **Operating Fund**

Total revenue was \$3,464 more than the budget, and total expenses were \$28,525 less than the budget. The actual net operating deficit is \$428,231 compared to a budgeted deficit of \$460,219.

Note: The Expendable Operating Cash-on-Hand is at 4.6 months, excluding the operating reserve of \$250,000 and the building reserve of \$125,000.

#### Gifts, Pledges, Bequests, Future Funds Greater than \$25,000, and Grants

Total new contributions for the month were \$898,990 including stock valued at \$78,957 from Mr. & Mrs. William and Nancy Doolittle for the Doolittle Fund; \$650,000 for The David and Lucile Packard Foundation for The David and Lucile Packard Foundation Fund; \$95,000 from S.T.A.R. Foundation of Monterey County for the S.T.A.R. Foundation of Monterey County Stewardship Fund; and \$30,000 from Mr. & Mrs. Richard S. and Joanna Reynolds for the Richard Scott Reynolds Science and Technology Education Scholarship Fund.

Grants to agencies for the month totaling \$1,508,920 were approved and recorded.

Interfund activity for the month totaled \$13,500.

Motion: to approve the February 28, 2015 financials. Tina Starkey Lopez/Steve McGowan Motion carried unanimously.

Tina summarized the 2014 audit process and commended Diane Nonella for another clean audit with no remarks. The auditors reported the internal controls were effective and required no additional processes.

Tina reported the finance committee goals for 2015 are to support CFMC to hire an Accounting Manager, to provide direction for fiscal responsibility and long-term financial needs.

#### **Grants and Programs Committee - Alfred Diaz-Infante**

Alfred Diaz-Infante reported there was one grant approval request. The CFMC Grants and Programs staff are requesting the approval of the proposed fund allocations for 2015 grants from the Futer Fund for Human and Humane Needs.

- \$227,942 from the Rudy E. Futer Fund for Human & Humane Needs to the Rudolph E. Futer Restricted Purpose Fund, for designated agency grants and administrative fees.
  - Rudolph E. Futer Restricted Purpose Fund designated agencies:
    - o \$56,985.50 to CARE U.S.A. San Francisco Region
    - o \$56,985.50 to Child Family Health International
    - o \$56,985.50 to Lifewater International
    - o \$56,985.50 to Humane Society of the United States

Motion: to approve \$227,942 from the Rudy E. Futer Fund for Human & Humane Needs to the Rudolph E. Futer Restricted Purpose Fund for four designated agency grants of \$56,985.50 each to: CARE U.S.A. - San Francisco Region, Child Family Health International, Lifewater International and Humane Society of the United States.

Greg Chilton/Alfred Diaz-Infante second. Motion carried unanimously.

Grant approval not on the agenda: Willemsen Family Fund grant for the reading specialist and /or teaching staff salaries at Sacajawea Elementary School, Seattle Washington.

Motion: to approve \$56,000 to the Sacajawea Elementary School, Seattle Washington from the Willemsen Family Fund. Greg Chilton / Alfred Diaz- Infante second. Motion carried unanimously.

Alfred reported the Grants and Program goals for 2015 are:

- Advance Community Impact grantmaking toward strategic results
- Expand Women's Fund economic security grantmaking and leadership
- Expand role of CNE in supporting community leadership and nonprofit effectiveness
- Continue expansion of activities in Salinas Valley/South County
- Increase Grants and Programs alignment with CFMC philanthropic services to expand services to donor advisors, private foundations and corporations and scholarship programs
- Assert CFMC leadership role in convening community around key issues

#### Investment Committee - Ken Petersen

Ken Petersen reported the Investment Committee continues to review the investment portfolio and analyze the spend rate for the long term. The committee and Wurts & Associates are evaluating the Foundations return objective and the portfolios prospective 10 year returns.

The Investment Committee's on-going goals are:

- Asset allocation and risk analysis
- Monitoring investment objectives, policies and procedures
- Evaluate the practices and performance, allocations, return goals and fees

The committee would like to determine whether a lower risk fund is a viable option for short-term stewardship and certain donor advised funds.

#### **Governance Committee – Dan Baldwin for Gail Delorey (absent)**

Dan Baldwin reported he will connect with Gail Delorey after the tax season.

#### **Resource Development Committee - Greg Chilton**

Greg Chilton reviewed the February Resource Development Summary and highlighted the Southern Monterey County Foundation at the fairgrounds in King City. Over 100 people attended the event. Christine Dawson reported that over \$75,000 has been generated by the "Founding Family" campaign where donors are asked to contribute \$1000 a year for five years or \$5000 now. Half of the money goes to the endowment and half to the non-endowed fund.

Greg Chilton summarized the Resource Development 2015 goals:

- Develop philanthropic services standards
- · Create Salinas Valley affiliate fund
- Latino philanthropy
- Develop a professional advisor council
- Revise Gift Acceptance Policy
- Increase scholarship funds
- Expand Legacy Society
- Update fund agreements

#### Funds approved electronically since last meeting - Dan Baldwin

No funds approved.

#### **New Fund Approvals - Dan Baldwin**

Dan described three new agency stewardship funds: The Morse Foundation Stewardship Fund, YWCA and Peace of Mind Rescue.

Motion: to approve three funds: The Morse Foundation Stewardship Fund, YWCA Stewardship Fund and Peace of Mind Rescue Stewardship Fund.

Greg Chilton / Steve McGowan second. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion to approve: The Dekker Davidson Foundation a non-endowed, donor advised fund. Steve McGowan / Ken Petersen second. Motion carried unanimously.

#### President/CEO Report - Dan Baldwin

Dan reported the sale of the Palm Terrace property in Hawaii is not moving forward with the current buyers, but there is a new prospect.

Rick Kennifer opened a discussion about the CFMC strategic plan. There was a lively conversation about impact investments, community leadership and the direction the CFMC might consider for the future. Alfred brought up the difference between a facilitator and a consultant for the process and felt having a facilitator was very beneficial. The Executive Committee reached a decision to bring the question of how to proceed to the full board at the April 21 meeting. Rick will recommend the use of a facilitator and a ½ day special meeting to update the CFMC strategic plan.

#### **Executive Session**

Rick Kennifer asked for a short Executive Session.

#### COMMUNITY FOUNDATION FOR MONTEREY COUNTY NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Four Months Ended April 30, 2015

#### **Assets**

Total Assets through 3/31/2015 are \$183,756,228 a 4.18% increase since April 2014, and a 2.48% increase since December 2014.

#### **Operating Fund**

Total revenue was \$14,766 less than the budget, and total expenses were \$50,271 less than the budget. The actual net operating deficit is \$188,138 compared to a budgeted deficit of \$223,643.

Note: The Expendable Operating Cash-on-Hand is at 5.6 months, excluding the operating reserve of \$250,000 and the building reserve of \$125,000.

#### Gifts, Pledges, Bequests, Future Funds Greater than \$25,000, and Grants

Total new contributions for the month were \$317,197 including stock valued at \$142,880 from Mr. & Mrs. William and Nancy Doolittle for the Doolittle Fund; and \$90,000 from the Morse Foundation to establish the Morse Foundation Stewardship Fund.

Grants to agencies for the month totaling \$364,990 were approved and recorded. A complete list of the grants by grantee is included.

Interfund activity for the month totaled \$217,700.

#### **Bequests Receivable**

We recorded a bequest receivable in the amount of \$2,000,000 from the estate of Mr. Richard W. La Salle for the Farrell/Allen Carmel Rotary Fund.

# Goal One: Community Impact Invest in developing healthy, safe and vibrant communities across Monterey County.

The CMFC has greatly evolved its grant programs through the development of the Community Impact grant program (which was modified for 2015) and closely working with donor advisors. The CFMC still seeks to have a grant making program that, while broad enough to address Monterey County's most pressing needs, has focus and results in tangible and demonstrable impact. All grant programs should seek to align with "investing in healthy, safe and vibrant communities across Monterey County. Goal one will be driven by the following three statements.

- 1. Proactively be a partner and catalyst for addressing community challenges.
- 2. Focus grant making toward strategic results.
- 3. Strengthen nonprofit sector excellence.

### Goal Two: Philanthropic Leadership Inspire and facilitate philanthropy throughout Monterey County.

The Community Foundation for Monterey County has a strong asset base, and an enviable percentage of endowed and/or discretionary assets. The CFMC's commitment to building endowment funds, primarily through planned gifts, has never waned. However, if so desired, more emphasis can be placed on building discretionary assets (unrestricted/field of interest). The gift life cycle of creating these funds through estate planning is very long and requires tremendous patience.

The CFMC's commitment to stronger relationships with donor advisors is producing remarkable results. We must now build on our successes. Not only must we continue to adhere to a resource development plan that actively engages and updates the professional advisor community, but we must continue to offer philanthropic value to individuals, families, corporations and private foundations.

Diversity in Monterey County takes many forms. Geography, Ethnicity. Gender. Even philanthropic interests. The CFMC must be creative in being aware of the ever-changing nature of Monterey County and developing relationships in all our communities.

- 1. Educate the public about philanthropy.
- 2. Grow CFMC's philanthropic assets.
- 3. Continue to enhance fund holder philanthropy.
- 4. Seek and align with funding partners to realize greater community impacts.
- 5. Seek a more diverse donor base.

# Goal Three: Community Leadership Recognize opportunities for facilitation of solutions to community issues.

The Community Foundation for Monterey County is a recognized leader in the nonprofit sector and the community overall. This has grown as the CFMC has increased its transparency, reached out to diverse audiences across the county, enhanced the work and profile of the Center for Nonprofit Excellence, and developed stronger partnerships with agencies and regional funders. Community leadership is an area that requires tremendous diplomacy, marked by a desire to help facilitate positive outcomes rather than work toward a pre-conceived CFMC solution.

- 1. Be mindful of emerging circumstances and issues where the CFMC can be a positive player in finding community solutions.
- 2. Respond proactively to emergencies, disasters, civic unrest, and other circumstances in which the staff and board of directors feel the CFMC can play a positive role.
- 3. Grow the CFMC's profile in advocacy when such activity can create a strong environment for the CFMC to prosper, or to mitigate circumstances that aligns with the CFMC's core values. This may be accomplished through participation in the League of California Community Foundations legislative advocacy work, working with the Council on Foundations, partnering with local organizations or, when appropriate, developing our own initiatives.
- 4. Utilize CFMC assets for community impact beyond grant making.

### Goal Four: Organizational Excellence Optimize performance and stewardship for maximum impact.

The CFMC takes great pride in being an exceptional organization. This can only be achieved through a commitment to excellence and constant reappraisal of our systems. Tremendous progress has been made over the past four years, but there is more to be done. The CFMC is expanding and becoming more complex. Our operations and organizational structure (including governance) must stay ahead of these changing circumstances.
